


















Hans Price v Nailsea Touch Rugby Club




Year 9 Football





SPARX Maths





Every time a student completes their Sparx I.S, they earn Sparx Experience Points (XP). Students earn more XP if they complete XP Boost or Target homework tasks in addition to their compulsory independent study (homework). Resource Base



We are excited to report that Hans Price Academy has been chosen by the local authority to host a new resource base for students who find it difficult to access learning in a mainstream school environment. This is a hugely positive endorsement of Hans Price Academy, and both our values as a school and the high-quality learning environment we offer.

The new resource base will likely accommodate up to 25 students once fully up-and-running, but is likely to open with half of that number. They will learn in a self-contained teaching building and outdoor space which will be created on the site of a disused changing room block near to the sports pitches at the front of the school. The building has been unusable for some years, so its demolition will be an additional positive for our school.

Students who attend the new resource base will typically be children with autism, or who have experienced emotion-based school avoidance. It will be a bespoke environment, staffed by specialist teachers, who will work with students to ensure they can reach their full potential. In some cases, that may mean working towards reintegration into a mainstream school environment.

Although the new facility will be part of the Hans Price community and overseen by our leadership team, it will be staffed separately and run independently. As such, it will be inspected separately by Ofsted and funded independently too – no money will be diverted from the Hans Price budget to pay for the new resource base, while its construction costs will be met in full by North Somerset Council.

Building work is expected to begin towards the end of this school year, which may require some temporary changes to car parking and pick-up/drop-off arrangements – we will provide further updates on this if changes become necessary. As much as possible of the work will be carried out during the summer break to minimise disruption. Current projections are for the resource base to be open by September 2026; however we will provide further updates in the future.

We are really pleased that Hans Price Academy has been handpicked by the council to help meet the acute and growing need for this type of provision in North Somerset. We will become one of only three schools in the district to host a provision of this type, and look forward to welcoming our new cohort of students in the future.



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
