

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# **College Cup Winners - Acer**





### **Greenpower Racing Day**



On Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> September the E-Car Race Club took part in a Race Day at Castle Combe. The aim of the race was to do as many laps in 90mins as possible on two 12V batteries.

The race day started with an unexpected turn when the chain broke during the initial practice while entering the pits. However, our technical know-how allowed us to quickly attach a new chain and get back out on the track within 15 minutes. The two races were fun but challenging due to the heavy rain. The pits were very crowded, but we were still able to achieve fast pit-stops giving our drivers as much time racing as possible. We also didn't get any penalties due to the whole crew following the pit lane regulations as instructed, this allowed us to move up a few positions at the end of the race. Everyone got to drive for at least 30 mins completing 5 laps of the circuit each. The car we built was simple but it was fast, enabling us to be able to overtake a lot of others in some of the most exciting moments of the day. In the end our car manged to travel almost 80 miles around the Castle Combe track which gave us a top 40 finish out of nearly 80 teams.



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### Year 10 Work Experience



Year 10 students will all complete a work experience placement from Tuesday 19<sup>th</sup> - Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> March 2024. Work experience is a vital and exciting part of mainstream education at Key Stage 4 which allows students to gain an insight into the world of work and learn key skills which will help inform students' career decisions. Students are encouraged to be independent and proactive in finding and confirming placements. In addition to your support at home, they will receive support in school through their SPACE lessons as well as individual guidance from our careers lead, Jackie Fielding, where needed.



Last year over 190 of our Year 10 cohort managed to secure themselves work experience placements with almost 100 employers spread across the country and beyond. Placements ranged from local retail, service and educational roles to placements as far reaching as London, the Scottish Highlands and Romania. We had students working in independent businesses as well as big corporate chains in a number of different sectors.

The aim is for students to secure placements before we break up in December. This allows adequate time for Health and Safety checks to be completed for businesses and work environments we have not had placements with before. It also avoids competition with other schools in the local area. Successful placements usually come from telephone enquiries, face to face visits or personal connections. Once an employer has agreed to a work experience placement they will need to complete a blue WEX form, these are available at the careers office. These forms capture the necessary company details and provide an agreement between the employer, student and parents/carers. The form must then be returned to Hans Price Reception or the Careers Office.

Work Experience is a fantastic opportunity to raise aspirations, broaden mindsets and introduce our students to the world of work. Last year saw more diverse and far-reaching placements than ever before. #### Post-16 Advice and Guidance Sessions for Year 11 Students

As an academy, we strive to support families with Post-16 applications and ensure that our students have access to up to date and relevant information to inform their choices. During the start of Year 11, we host Post-16 assemblies from a variety of providers promoting a range of options including College, Sixth-Form and apprenticeship routes. Every child in Year 11 will also receive a 1:1 session with Jackie Fielding, our Careers Advisor. As a school, we can support students with their applications, but we strongly recommend families attend open day events in the community for their top choice selections. As a guide, **all students in Year 11 should have made 3 applications to Post-16 providers by the Christmas holidays**. 

#### The Hidden Dangers of Vaping: What You Need to Know

Electronic cigarettes are designed to deliver the nicotine 'high' without the smoke. E-cigs, also known as 'vapes', come in lots of different designs. Some look like cigarettes with a glowing tip, others look a bit like pens. The level of nicotine can vary, and they are available in different flavours.

#### What's in them?

- Nicotine (although non-nicotine e-cigs are also available)
- Propylene glycol (which is the same thing that theatrical fog contains)
- Vegetable glycerine
- Flavourings

E-cigs and the law - From 1 October 2015, it became illegal for a retailer to sell electronic cigarettes or e-liquids to anyone under the age of 18. It also became illegal for an adult to purchase any nicotine containing product on behalf of someone under 18, which would include E -cigarettes or E-liquids which contain nicotine.

#### The Unknown Consequences

Vaping is a relatively new, and long-term studies on its effects are limited. However, emerging research indicates that vaping may pose significant health risks: E-cigarettes contain aerosols and chemicals that can cause inflammation and damage to the lungs, causing breathing problems, as well as nicotine which can soon become highly addictive.

#### Advice for Students

- Stay Informed: Make sure to educate yourself on the risks associated with vaping and don't get swayed by peer pressure or advertising claims that suggest it's 'safe'.
- Talk to Trusted Adults: If you're unsure about vaping or need advice, don't hesitate to speak to parents, teachers, or healthcare professionals.
- Seek Support: If you or a friend are already vaping and want to quit, there are resources and support networks available to help.

#### Advice for Parents

- Open Dialogue: Create an open and non-judgmental space for your children to discuss vaping. It's more effective to engage in a conversation than to lecture.
- Set an Example: The best way to discourage your children from vaping is by not doing it yourself.
- Know the Signs: Familiarise yourself with vaping devices and products, so you can identify them if you see them.

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
### **Sparx Maths**


#### Word Millionaires!
