Sun Safety at HPA



At Hans Price Academy we take sun safety very seriously and want to remind students and staff to protect themselves from the sun's harmful ultra-violet rays during the summer months. There are five simple rules to follow:



Slip on a protective clothing



Slop on Factor 50 sunscreen

Slap on a hat



Slide on some quality sunglasses



Seek out some shade



Sunscreen needs to be applied at home before the day starts but will also need to be re-applied during the morning and afternoon for it to be effective, especially if you are lucky enough to be splashing around in some warm seas or participating in water sports. Remember to apply correct coverage to all skin areas which are likely to be exposed to the sun. Most creams have a shelf life of around two years, so please check your expiry dates. When buying sunscreen, you will need to look for at least a sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 and a Ultraviolet Radiation (UV) of at least 4 star.

It is advised by the NHS to follow the sun protection rules of 'Slip, Slop, Slap, Slide and Seek' from 1st April until 30th October, even on cloudy days. You can check the UV forecast on a regular occasion for an indication of how strong the sun is predicted to be. Any UV levels higher than a level 3 will require protection.

45% of all UV skin damage occurs before the age of 20. You can burn in the UK even on cloudy days! Teenage Cancer Trust state that 'Skin cancer is the second most common cancer amongst young adults, getting painful sunburn twice a year can triple your chances of being diagnosed. Two young adults are diagnosed with skin cancer every day in the UK.'

We want you to be outdoors enjoying the fresh air during the summer months, but please do it in a safe manner and protect yourself from the sun and always keep yourself hydrated.

WORK EXPERIENCE 2023 - CREATING OPPORTUNITIES

Can you help our students secure quality Work Experience?

In the last week of term we are beginning to talk about work experience with Year 9 students as they will be completing a week of work experience in Year 10 from 20th-24th March 2023.

Earlier this year, despite challenges faced by Covid-19, we saw our current Year 10 students access more diverse and far reaching placements than ever before. Students surpassed expectations in securing placements and representing themselves, Hans Price Academy and our wider community to an exceptionally high standard. With the support of our Careers Lead, Jackie Fielding, and parents and carers, over 145 of our Year 10 cohort managed to secure work experience placements with almost 100 employers spread across the country. Placements ranged from supporting students in our local community at primary schools to flying to Guernsey to install marine electronics. We were the first academy locally to reinstate WEX in its traditional format and our students paved the way for employers to welcome back future Hans Price students.

This being said, finding suitable WEX placements is always challenging. Work Experience is a fantastic opportunity to raise aspirations, broaden mindsets and introduce our students to the world of work. 

GENERAL DATA PROTECTION REGULATION

Dfe Updates Model Privacy Notices

What Has Changed?

- The Department for Education (DfE) has updated its model privacy notices for schools to provide to pupils, parents, governors and employees.

Summary of the Changes:

- The General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) requires schools to provide certain information to data subjects about their personal data. This information is commonly provided in a privacy notice.
- *The significant changes are as follows:*
 - The list of suggested categories of pupil personal data has been expanded.
 - The DfE clarifies that a legal basis under Article 6 of GDPR should be named for each purpose of processing personal data. Where special category personal data (eg information about health, ethnicity, religious view and political opinions) is processed, then a legal condition from Article 9 should also be included in the notice.
 - It is a requirement to tell individuals for how long their information will be retained. A copy of this data retention policy is available within the Academy or alternatively you can email dataprotection@clf.education
 - The section on what rights individuals have in their personal data has been reworded and slightly expanded.

Impact on School Compliance Framework

- There are no new requirements placed on schools by these updated model privacy notices. That being said, the Cabot Learning Federation has in particular, reviewed its privacy notices to ensure they comply with the DfE's emphasis on listing a legal basis (or bases) for each purpose for processing personal data. This is a key requirement of such privacy notices.

This year has been difficult for school attendance with Covid 19 illness absence, students adjusting to returning to school and now the heatwave.

We are looking forward to a very successful year from September and we will continue to encourage and support all students to attend school as much as possible as we all know that excellent attendance plays an important part in students achieving their very best and gaining the most from their education.



We always have lots of fantastic prizes each term to encourage attendance and punctuality including:

- Weekly donuts for the Learning Families achieving the highest attendance and best punctuality.
- Chocolate bars every time a student achieves 6 weeks of full attendance
- Pizza, cakes, ice-cream and other food treats
- Halloween, Christmas and Easter draws for hampers, treats and non-uniform days.
- We have an annual poster design competition and quizzes based around attendance.



There are also lots of opportunities for us to recognise those students who may struggle to achieve 100% attendance but who strive to make improvements and do their best.



There will be many more rewards next year so don't forget to look out for weekly Attendance Challenges and Rewards on the noticeboards!

LIVING WITH COVID 19



The Government expectation is that we should all be learning to live with Covid and treat it the same as any other infectious disease. If your child is not well enough to be in school, they should not attend, as with any other illness.

Children and young people with mild symptoms such as a runny nose, headache, sore throat, slight cough, feeling sick or mild aches and pains who are otherwise well, can continue to attend school.

If your child is unwell and they have a high temperature, they should stay at home and avoid contact with other people where they can. They can come back to school and resume normal activities when they no longer have a high temperature and they are well enough to attend.

The Government has advised that children and young people aged 18 and under should **not** be tested for Covid-19 unless advised to do so by a medical professional. If these students test positive, they are advised to try to stay home and avoid contact with people for 3 days. Children and young people who live with someone who has a positive Covid 19 test result can continue to attend school as normal if they feel well and do not have a high temperature.

SUPPORT FOR FREQUENT ABSENTEES

In an effort to support your child and encourage them to come to school as much as possible, we may ask for medical evidence or make a home visit to check on their welfare if they are frequently absent with illness.



If you have any concerns and would like support in improving your child's attendance, please contact your child's College Leader or a member of the Pastoral Support Team or the Attendance Team.

As always, we believe that all students will attain the best outcomes if they attend school fully and on time. We will work with all students and families to ensure that barriers to learning are explored and that students are fully supported to achieve their potential. Holidays/Leave of Absence in Term Time



Please avoid booking holidays in term time. Your child needs to be in school every day to gain the most from their education. We are unable to authorise leave of absence requests unless the time off is absolutely necessary and there are exceptional circumstances. All leave of absence requests need to be made as far in advance as possible using the appropriate form available from the Academy Reception or Attendance Office.



As the climate changes.....

PLEASE TAKE CARE IN THE SUN

Too much sun can be dangerous and can make you unwell.

Always use sunscreen, stay in the shade as much as possible and drink plenty of fluids.

School is a safe place to be and whilst it may be hot outside, adjustments are made to enable children to continue with their education with as little disruption as possible. We all have a responsibility to look after ourselves and our children in the hot weather. We will not authorise time off due to feeling hot and tired or if we think the absence could have been avoided with better care.

During the winter months, please ensure that your child has suitable outdoor clothing or an umbrella to protect them from the Great British winter weather.

Coats and jackets can be stored in lockers.

Absence will not be authorised if your child is not prepared and is absent due to wet or cold weather conditions.



LATE ARRIVAL TO SCHOOL



Punctuality is an important life skill and prompt arrival at the Academy each day is expected. Please remember, the front doors open for students at 08.20 and close at 08.35am.

Students arriving at 8.36am will be marked late and will be given a detention at breaktime unless there is an unavoidable reason and parents contact us to confirm this. If students fail to attend their breaktime detention, there will be a 45 minute detention after school on Fridays. If a student is late 3 times in 1 week, a 45 minute detention after school on Friday will also be issued.

Morning registration marks are taken from Period 1 registers. Any student who arrives after this will be marked as absent for the morning session. If there is no good reason for the late arrival, eg. an unavoidable medical appointment or illness, again confirmed by a parent, the absence will be unauthorised. Persistent absence due to late arrival can result in a penalty notice fine for parents in the same way as unauthorised absence for the whole day.

Why is punctuality important?

- **Being on time makes a real difference; it shows you are reliable and can be depended on.**
- **Punctuality makes a great impression; it shows you respect others and value their time**
- **You will be seen as organised, trustworthy and consistent.**
- **Being on time to school and to lessons will help you form good habits for your future career and personal life**






SIMS PARENT APP

QUICK SETUP GUIDE

The SIMS Parent app allows us to easily communicate with you, the parent. Whether it's sharing information such as attendance, school reports or sending reminders for homework tasks, all of the information is easily accessible from the convenience of your phone, tablet or PC.

We can now easily send automated alerts and notifications directly to your phone! By sharing information on attendance, homework and timetables or school reports and conduct, you can stay on top of your child's progress. A clear dashboard gives you an overview of your child's school life and the data collection functionality within the app lets you easily update your contact information too.

Follow the steps below to setup and install the SIMS Parent App.



STEP #1: Receive the Activation Email

1. We will send you an activation email. Simply click on the link inside the email from your tablet, PC or smartphone to activate your account.
2. After clicking on the link in the email you will now be asked to login using your Facebook, Twitter, Google or Microsoft username and password.
3. You will be asked the date of birth for one of your children at the school.
4. Congratulations, you have registered for the SIMS Parent App.
Now you just need to download the app!

Waste



We have continued to reduce plastic waste by becoming a single use plastic bottle free site, during normal classes. We have had new water filling stations installed and all students received a HPA water bottle at the start of the year.

On Monday 11th July we held our first paper free day. This meant the printers were not available for a whole day.

We asked members of staff to think about alternative teaching methods to reduce printing. This day we saved over 5000 pieces of paper being printed. We hope to run this initiative again in the year to try and encourage longer term reduction in paper.



During sports day, 10 large bags of rubbish was filtered from the general rubbish, to be recycled.

Ex Year 11 students completed a beach clean in their activity week.



Biodiversity



We have developed a garden. It started off at a singular vegetable bed but has now grown into a shed and two areas where we are able to grow vegetables. The Eco Committee take part in many things including presenting data at meetings, having full committee discussions on how to improve our garden and getting the chance to develop the environment around us.

There are five students who are involved in our school garden along with two teachers who supervise us whilst we work on the garden. The Duke of Edinburgh participants gave us our first vegetable bed and composter to help us along our journey of becoming more eco-friendly. Whilst the Engage centre donated money towards us buying our second bed, the school's leadership team gave us the water butt and topsoil. We have harvested many vegetables such as garlic and onions along with increasing biodiversity by planting flowers.



Our future gardening plans are to maintain and grow our garden, to naturally reduce weeds, be able to compost properly, get more students involved and finally promote biodiversity.



Provide trees for bees

Did you know that bees get most of their nectar from trees? When a tree blossoms, it provides hundreds - if not thousands - of blossoms to feed from. Trees are not only a great food source for bees, but also an essential habitat, trees and resin provides nesting material for bees, while natural wood cavities make excellent shelter, with deforestation and development on the rise you can help make a difference by caring for trees and joining tree planting parties in your area.

Plant A Bee Garden

One of the biggest threats to bees is a lack of safe habitat where they can build homes and find a variety of nutritious food sources. By planting a bee garden, you can create a habitat corridor with plants that are rich in pollen and nectar. You don't need a lot of space to grow bee-friendly plants - gardens can be established across yards and in window boxes, flower pots, and planters. You can also get involved with local organizations and governments to find opportunities to enrich public and shared spaces.

Build a Home For Native Bees

Did you know that with the exception of honey bees are solitary creatures? 70% of solitary bees live underground, while 30% live in holes in the side of trees or hollow stems. Species like bumble bees build their nest in undisturbed areas you can provide a safe haven for them by leaving an undisturbed plot of land for them in your garden! "Bee condos" - which have small apartments - allow species like mason bees to take up residence. they're easy to make and purchase.

Create a Bee Bath


Bees work up quite a flutter foraging and collecting nectar. Fill a shallow bowl or bowl with clean water and orange pebbles and stones inside so that they break the water's surface. Bees will land on the stones and pebbles to take a long refreshing drink.

Go Chemical-Free For Bees

Synthetic pesticides, fertilizers, herbicides, and neonicotinoids are harmful to bees, weakening their sensitive system. Avoid treating your garden and green spaces with synthetics, instead use organic products and natural solutions such as compost, soil health and adding beneficial insects that keep away like ladybugs and praying mantises.

Transport



We have joined Modeshift stars with help from North Somerset Council. We have identified areas where we are currently meeting the initiatives. We also identified areas where we wanted to develop transport. Due to covid restrictions we were not able to implement the items in orange. We plan in the next academic year to resume bike-ability and work towards our Modeshift awards.

Results from our travel survey, showing 52% of our students walk to school, 14.7% cycle, 1% use a scooter. This is 67% using sustainable travel options. Next year we are looking to increase this to 75%.



If you've not already done so, install the Xpressions App.

Once you've installed the app, open it, enter your email address and click 'Next.'

All personal details will be taken from the school records, so the information you provide needs to match what they have on file. If you are unable to enter details successfully you will need to speak to your school office. If you are sure you have entered information correctly but you still see an error message, it is likely that the school records are incorrect so please contact your school.

Enter your mobile number and click 'Next.'

When you have entered details correctly you will receive a text message to your mobile phone containing a 6 digit code.

Enter this code and click 'Login.'
